PARTE ONE

1. What can change when you use two object pronouns together?
The indirect object pronouns (le or les only) **can** change to a "SE" **when** **and if** they are followed by the direct object pronouns LO, LA, LOS or LAS.
Why? Sound/alliteration of the two L's
2. What is the WORD ORDER for these pronouns? (1st? 2nd? 3rd?)
DOP SUBJECT IOP
Subject – IOP – DOP (conjugated verb)
Subject – conjugated verb – infinitive+IOP+DOP
3. Where – in relation to specific verb forms – can these terms be placed?
 1. In front of a conjugated verb
 2. ATTACHED to the END of an infinitive

1. You (informal) gave them to me. (the boarding passes)
Tú me las diste.
2. He confirmed them for us. (the flights)
Él nos los confirmó.
3. I am going to buy it for you (informal). (the ticket)
Te lo voy a comprar.
Voy a comprartelo.
4. We want to make them for her. (the reservations)
Se las queremos hacer.
Queremos hacerselas.
5. They need to recommend them to you (formal). (them = day trips/hikes)
Ellos se las necesitan recomendar.
Ellos necesitan recomendarselas.
